McHENRY COUNTY HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION FY 1999 – 2000 ANNUAL REPORT OVERVIEW

Development in McHenry County continues. Rural subdivisions and land expansion by municipalities hold the potential for continued loss of historic structures and scenic rural vistas. In light of development trends, the McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission is committed to creating a balanced perspective for the County, to help preserve that which is best and to support a county-wide coordinated effort to identify and protect valuable sites and structures before development encroaches upon them.

I. Cases Reviewed

In fiscal year 1999-2000 the Commission reviewed and granted one *Certificate of Appropriateness* related to Woodstock Street (the County's 15th local landmark) located within the Village of Huntley. The Certificate was approved and allowed the Village to proceed with the reconstruction project.

No Certificates of Economic Hardship were issued.

II. Designations (See Appendix A.)

In fiscal year 1999-2000 the Commission held two (2) public hearings for local land-mark designations:

 #HP 00-01: The Allendale Truss Bridge was formally designated McHenry County's sixteenth local landmark on the 16th of May 2000 by a unanimous vote of the County Board.

The Allendale Truss Bridge is one of the last remaining pre-concrete bridges in McHenry County. Standing as a witness to history, it is set in a picturesque location in Greenwood Township. The sixty-one year old utilitarian structure carries traffic and at the same time helps convey connections to a more rural past. Good consistent maintenance enables it to meet today's life-safety requirements.

 #HP 99-02: On 3 October 2000, the McHenry County Board unanimously voted to designate the *Carr-Harrison Cemetery (circa. 1842)*, located within the corporate limits of the Village of Ringwood, as McHenry County's seventeenth local landmark Through cooperative efforts an intergovernmental agreement was signed by the Village and County. (The Commission was able to use the standardized agreement developed last year with the State's Attorney's help when the Village of Huntley designated Woodstock Street.) The collaboration not only helped safeguard this private "double" cemetery, it also contributed to the preservation of historic structures in another incorporated area, and to once again facilitate awareness of McHenry's historic resources.

III. Survey

During FY 1999-2000, Jim Pearson and Mike Walkup joined the survey committee. In addition to visiting sites in Alden Township, the Committee surveyed the Allendale Bridge and the Carr-Harrison Cemetery both of which were plaqued during the fiscal year. Mr. Keefe contacted the farm bureau regarding a letter he received about Fred Hatch the inventor of the upright silo. The Committee also compiled a list of all McHenry County cemeteries. And once again, Chairman Keefe represented the Commission t the Civil War Round Table meetings as well as speaking to various groups throughout the County.

IV. National Register

In fiscal year 1999-2000 no National Register nominations were considered by the Commission. No National Register nominations are pending.

V. Monitoring

The Commission did not formally review nor identify any cases of alteration/ demolition to National Register or Illinois Register properties in McHenry County. It has, however, been in contact with the owner of the Hibbard House in Marengo. Unfortunately, the Commission could not obtain once again, any assurances about preserving the structure. See December minutes for newspaper article.

VI. Activities

The start of the new year found the Commission working diligently with the Joint Council of Historic Groups preparing for two yearly meetings. The first, scheduled for March 29th and hosted by the Algonquin Historic Commission, was titled the "Restoration of Woodstock Street, a Work in Progress" and featured a presentation / discussion presented by trustees from the Village of Huntley. The second meeting

held in September at Richmond's Memorial Hall, highlighted the re-channelization of Nippersink Creek. Guest speaker for the meeting was Ed Collins.

Gail Drabant was recognized by the McHenry County Board on February 15th. Chairman Tryon awarded Ms. Drabant a plaque acknowledging her work not only with the rural survey, but also her crusade in saving and restoring the Powers-Walker House.

Spring brought about preparation for the Seventh Annual Awards Program. Held once again at the historic Dole Mansion in Crystal Lake on May 16th, the ever popular program recognized winners in ten separate categories. The Awards Committee spent many long hours working to make the afternoon memorable for all.

The Commission recommended two properties for designation during FY 1999-2000. A public hearing was held on May 3rd for the Allendale Truss Bridge in Greenwood Township. County Board Member Don Larson, along with township officials, took part in the landmark ceremony on August 19th. The public hearing for the Carr-Harrison Cemetery (included an intergovernmental agreement with the Village of Ringwood) was held on September 6th. On October 29th over fifty family members and friends attended the landmark ceremony. Planning and Development Committee Chairman, Donna Schaefer, presented the plaque. (See appendix for designation information.)

In addition to the work implementing the intergovernmental agreement with the Village of Ringwood, copies of both agreements (Huntley and Ringwood) were sent to the Kane County Department of Planning, Zoning and Environmental Quality and to the Village of Richmond. Hopefully, Kane County will be able to enact a like document and the Village of Richmond will enter into a working relationship with McHenry County.

During the summer months, the Endangered Sites Sub-Committee developed a list of historic structures most threatened by development, taxation, disuse, neglect, forces of nature and vandalism. A form was designed and distributed throughout the County to help residents recognize structures most worthy of saving, to provide direction when possible, and to increase citizen awareness.

Natural Features Chair, Gloria Mack, initiated a "Scenic Road Program" to recognize both roads and streetscapes located in municipal and unincorporated areas. By identifying significant scenic, natural, and historic resources within roadway corridors, the program aims to establish a sense of place through community recognition. The honorarium is intended to be a tribute without restriction. When a funding mechanism is established, signs will be place along

road sides highlighting scenic vistas for drivers, cyclists, walkers and sightseers alike.

The Commission also made presentations to the Planning & Development and Management Services Committees regarding photo murals of designated County landmarks for public display in the Government Center. With enthusiastic support from committee and department heads the Commission was able to accrue budget monies and has begun to work towards this "artful" goal.

Per the requirements for Certified Local Government status, Gloria Mack, Jim Keefe and Maryanne Wanaski attended the Landmarks Preservation Council of Illinois' seminar held in Lake Forest. It was well organized and very informative. (See appendix for information.)

With much sadness Jim Keefe, local historian and one of the Commission's founding members, submitted his resignation. County Board Chairman, Mike Tryon honored Jim and presented him with a resolution acknowledging his volunteerism over the last decade. Jim will be greatly missed.

Carrie Koster-Horan, a professional archaeologist, with federal and state preservation experience was officially welcomed to fill the vacancy. She brings a wealth of knowledge and a spirit for "liking" hard work with her appointment. The Commission presently has all nine seats filled.

The Commission's on-going work through its Municipal Liaison assisted the City of Marengo and the Village of Greenwood's preservation commissions with help drafting ordinances. The Commission also drafted a format to be used for public hearings.

COMMISSION CHAIRMANSHIP:

McHenry County has continued in its endeavor to encourage historic preservation. Specifically the McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission has contributed in this goal in the past year through the following major efforts.

The Commission conducted a successful awards program. We had a large number of nominations. Through recognition of positive efforts, we can encourage more preservation. Also, this program raised the level of awareness of historic architecture. Since much of historic preservation is done by concerned individuals, this educational process is at the heart of preservation. We can accomplish much by preservation through education of individuals as to just what is appropriate historic restoration. We are looking forward to an equally successful awards program this next year.

Also, in trying to raise public awareness of historic structures in McHenry County, we donated the remaining portion of our 1998-1999 budget to the production of a Historic Sites Map of McHenry County produced by the Historical Society. The main benefit of this map is that instead of being available by purchase it is being given out free of charge so that it reaches far more people instead of just the preservation-minded people that would normally purchase such a map. Grant funding was also obtained for this project by the Historical Society. The unveiling and initial distribution was originally scheduled for the Summer of 2000 but due to technical difficulties, the map will not be ready until March/April of 2001.

The FY 1999-2000 surplus budget has been accrued in order to purchase murals for the McHenry County Government Center of the County's local landmarks. Again in an effort to reach out and raise public awareness, the Commission voted unanimously to undertake this special project over the next two years. With full County Board approval and support, it is hoped that these photo murals will promote public awareness of McHenry County's historic resources and once again promote preservation efforts.

In addition to these main areas of emphasis in 2000, we also landmarked a family cemetery and a steel truss bridge. We have had trouble convincing people to landmark their homes, since most are concerned about the ordinance protection as viewed as limitations to future owners. This is an area we will need to clarify in the future in order to encourage more landmark designations.

I have enjoyed the opportunity to chair this Commission for the last three years and am looking forward to continued commission work with someone else as chairman. All organizations need new ideas to keep enthusiasm at its peek while still accomplishing overall goals.

Natural Features/Scenic Roads

In January of this year the Natural Features committee initiated a Scenic Road Program. We met with the McHenry County Highway Department and discussed cosponsoring this program. It was suggested by the head of the highway department that a letter be sent to all the government entities in the County seeking their input on this program. I prepared a letter and sent a copy to the Highway Department for their approval. We did not receive a response from the Highway Department until April. At that time we discussed the proposed letter. It was at this meeting that The Highway Department informed us that they decided they would not cosponsor the Scenic Road Program, however, they would serve as advisors.

In July a letter was sent to all the government entities in McHenry County (See Attached). Several municipalities responded that they would be interested in the program. In September it was called to my attention that Kane County had a Scenic Road Program. It was at this time that Scott Berger a Planner from Kane County and myself began a dialogue. He sent me Kane County's Scenic Road information and since Kane County had not used inter-governmental agreements as McHenry County had we shared that information with him.

At this time we are working on an application and informational brochure. It is the committees goal that this program be up and running by June.

Joint Council of Historic Groups

The McHenry County Joint Council of Historic Groups meets twice a year. Our first meeting this year was on March 29th. The meeting was hosted by the Algonquin Historical Commission. Our program for the meeting was presented by the Village of Huntley on the restoration of Woodstock Street. Sue Lamb a Village Trustee and residents of Woodstock Street presented a brief overview of the Woodstock Street project and then engaged in a question and answer session. Appropriately 35 member of various historic groups attended.

Our fall Joint Council Meeting was held at the historic Richmond Memorial Hall. Our program was presented by Ed Collins a Restoration Biologist from McHenry County Conservation District, who provided a slide program on the restoration of the Nippersink Creek to its original route. It was one of the more interesting programs the Joint Council sponsored.

County Administrator's Weekly Newsletter

Activities for the week of August 4, 2000



Management Services Committee 8/01/00 - Committee members recommended approval of a Resolution authorizing an extension of the lease with the McHenry County Fair Association



Transportation Committee 8/02/00 – The Committee interviewed three firms concerning the design of the Ackman Road Extension from Lakewood Road to Haligus Road. The committee approved of Smith Engineering to begin negotiations for this design work.

The committee discussed the LITH airport improvements whereby one alternate is now being looked at more closely. Highway Dept. staff presented comments to the advisory committee on concerns for the realignment of Pyott Road. Those comments are now being reviewed and will be addressed.

A speed study performed on River Road in Marengo Township did not warrant a reduction in speed at this time, but may be addressed in the future if prevailing speeds can be reduced.

Bids were accepted on behalf of Nunda Township for necessary bridge repairs on Bull Valley Road east of Curran Road.



Drug & Alcohol Committee 8/02/00- Committee members discussed the "Law Enforcement" aspect of the Public Hearings. The State's Attorney's office noted a need for an additional DUI prosecutor but stated there is currently a lack of funds to hire an additional prosecutor and a lack of space in the office for additional personnel. It was noted that a Grant could be obtained in January to pay

for the new prosecutor but there would still be the space issue. Sheriff Department personnel noted the need to strengthen the current laws to close the loopholes that suspected drunk drivers seem to get through. If the suspected drunk driver has been stopped or arrested before he already knows to refuse certain sobriety tests in order to weaken a DUI case. The Committee will meet with area Legislators on August 16 to discuss possible legislation changes.



Planning & Development 8/04/00 - Proposed regulations for peaker plants were discussed with several items of importance. The definition of peaker plant, 8 standards and the zoning chart were provided to the Committee for review and discussion at the next meeting. The discussion centered around groundwater and EPA air standards. The 'need' issue will be heard by the Zoning Board of Appeals rather than decided before hand. The Committee will discuss limiting the zoning by conditional use in Industrial Zoning at the next meeting.

The Committee approved a joint resolution for the Subarea Residential Planning Demonstration Project.

The Committee referred local landmark photo item to the Management Services Committee.

Survey Committee Report 2000

We had two new members added to the survey committee in the past year; Jim Pearson and Michael Walkup.

Our landmarkings this year were the Allendale Truss Bridge located in Greenwood Township and the Carr-Harrison Cemetery in the Village of Ringwood. Turnout for the designation ceremony for the bridge included County Board Member, Don Larson; Nancy Fike and Roger May, nominators and the Greenwood Township Supervisor. For the Carr-Harrison Cemetery about 50 family members attended and Donna Schaefer, County Board Member and Chair of the Planning and Development Committee handed out the plaque.

We visited sites in Alden and handed out literature. We are still waiting for responses. The farm bureau is not interested in following up on Fred Hatch the inventor of the upright silo. The Commission may want to discuss this item again. Amy Duncan of the Conservation District also informed me that the project regarding the Civil War graves near Marengo is on hold for at least the next 5 years.

Our committee reinvented the wheel again by revisiting locations that former survey members had seen. Again, the sites in Alden have been surveyed before.

A Mr. Clarence Chinn, from Harvard, Illinois called last year about his farm house west of town. In talking to him the house has been totally changed and I doubt if it is still historically significant. We visited the site in March and committee members were in agreement that it has been remodeled and is not qualified for landmark status.

As always we continue to send out applications. Hopefully some owners will go the next step.

It is with a sad heart that this is my last year on the Commission. I wish you all bountiful perseverance as you carry out your role as Commission members.

Endangered Historic Sites Committee Chairpersons: Jennifer Iftner and David Gervais

In an attempt to get this committee in motion, David and I had several discussions as to the direction this project should take. We also brought our committee up for discussion at the September 2000 Joint Council Meeting, in attempt to solicit volunteers and glean ideas and information.

We have come up with a proposed form to be distributed at local museums, city halls, and via McHenry County historic organizations. This form has been submitted to the McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission for review and revising. At this time there have been no changes made. The form is attached.

One of our goals with this committee is to begin to build a database or catalog of historic sites that meet our criteria of endangerment. We would like to have background information and photographs (then and now) of each property. This information would be maintained in the Commission library.

Another goal is to create interest and to generate a course of action that results in the potentially endangered property being removed off of the endangered list.

A third goal of this committee is to educate interested parties as to what actions may endanger a property and how to rectify ensuing detrimental results, or avoid them entirely.

In the next year, 2001, we need to compile an initial list of potentially endangered sites and begin to catalogue these sites. It is important to have accurate records and good photographs of these sites, as many of them are lost before they can be helped.

Dear Jim:

I am writing to you as someone who shares my interest in local history. While we both presently serve on the McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission, I am also a past president and life member of the McHenry County Historical Society and have been a resident of McHenry County since the mid-1960s.

It is my opinion that there is only one structure that was ever built in McHenry County that is worthy of national attention, and that structure is the Fred Hatch silo located in Spring Grove. If my memory is correct Mr. Hatch returned to Spring Grove after receiving a degree in agriculture from the University of Illinois. The above-ground silo that he built in Spring Grove in 1873 was the first of its kind.

The site of the Fred Hatch silo was plaqued by the McHenry County Historical Society years ago. Unfortunately the site has fallen into disrepair and the silo itself no longer exists.

I was wondering if the Farm Bureau might have an interest in the production of a replica of the Hatch silo so that more people could become aware of its importance. It is unfortunate that the original silo no longer exists, but a replica would still make people aware of its significance. Eric Sloane in his book <u>An Age of Barns</u> points out that Fred Hatch was the inventor of the silo and that it was not until years later that the silo began appearing on eastern farms.

Although I am not an architect or engineer, I do not believe that the actual construction or the expense of building a replica would be prohibitive. I think it would be nice to have a replica built in the Spring Grove area near the original site. However, I think access to the site would be of equal importance.

On March 8th I met with the Marengo Historic Commission. I provided them a copy of the County Ordinance, we discussed landmarking, public hearingsetc. Barbara Bigalke, the Chairman of the Commission will be providing us a copy of the Marengo Ordinance. I think it might adventageous if we have copies of all the Preservation Ordinances enacted by the various municipalities.

Upon receipt of the application for the Harrison/Carr Cemetery which is located in the Village of Ringwood we realized we would need an intergovernmental agreement to protect the cemetery. Ringwood's attorney was out of town, Maryanne suggested that a resolution by Ringwood would allow us to act on the application. 

Historic Preservation Commission of Crystal Lake

Dear members of the McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission,

The Historic Preservation Commission of Crystal Lake is now in its fourth year. Regarding the nomination for the award for the <u>Outstanding Historical Achievement by a Group</u>, I have already sent you a copy of the article published in *The Commissioner*, an IAHPC publication, and a copy of the IAHPC Local Preservation Award for 1999. We are very proud of what we have accomplished. Commission activities for the past year are as follows:

On June 13, 1999, the Commission sponsored its second annual Heritage Tour featuring three homes on N. Caroline Street. Despite a torrential rain, over 100 very enthusiastic people toured these very interesting homes. We are now busy planning our third Heritage Tour on June 11th, which will feature Pomeroy Avenue between Crystal Lake Avenue and Ash Avenue. Five homes will be open to tour and the remainder of the homes will be featured in photos and architectural descriptions.

On September 24th through September 26th, 1999, Joan Sanders and Mary Thennes attended the Illinois Preservation Conference in Quincy, Illinois. At the conference the Crystal Lake Historic Preservation Commission was awarded the Illinois Association of Historic Preservation Commission's Local Preservation Award for a Commission. The award was given on the basis of the significant contributions that we have made to the community in our short history. We are delighted to have the award and trophy on display in the trophy case at city hall.

The Commission recommended for landmark designation one of the featured homes on the June Heritage Tour. The Collen House at 70 North Caroline Street thus became our 4th landmark designation by Ordinance #5220 when it was approved by the City Council on November 16, 1999.

The Winter 2000 edition of *The Commissioner*, a quarterly newsletter published by the Illinois Association of Historic Preservation Commissions (IAHPC), featured an article written by Mary Thennes titled "Local Preservation in Crystal Lake". This spotlight on Crystal Lake and the Commission included the cover page, two additional full pages and again recognized us as the 1999 award winner.

In December we received an Illinois Historic Preservation Agency (IHPA) Grant to conduct an Intensive Survey of the Crystal Lake Downtown neighborhood bounded by Crystal Lake Avenue, Walkup Avenue, Terra Cotta Avenue and Main Street. The \$10,000 grant is a 60/40 split between the IHPA and the City of Crystal Lake. The Commission has contracted with Linda Grubb & Associates, an architectural firm located in Barrington, to conduct the survey and to follow the guidelines of the IHPA.

The Commission donated the video Residential Architectural Styles in Illinois produced by the IHPA to the Crystal Lake Library. This was the beginning of an alliance with the library, which includes the Commission sharing space in the Local History Room with the Genealogy Society. We are stocking shelves in the Local History Room with copies of preservation magazines and will be creating notebooks with local preservation information. The Library will be also be allowing us a display for National Preservation Week on May 14 – 20.

A Guest Editorial on the Dole Mansion, one of Crystal Lake's most significant landmarks, was submitted by Diana Kenney to the Northwest Herald, and was printed in the newspaper on Sunday, April 2rd. The article was written to advance the goal of the Commission, which is to educate the community on the history, culture and architecture of Crystal Lake.

The Commission has been working on a list of Significant Structures in Crystal Lake, the landmarking of Lake Avenue Cemetery, a WEB site, slide presentations, and many other related activities

Endangered Historic Sites Chairpersons Jennifer Iftner and David Gervais:

On June 22, 2000, David Gervais and I met to discuss this committee. We agreed on the importance of developing a philosophy for this area as well as firm, well understood policies.

To avert possible ill-will and misunderstanding, we decided that a more appropriate title might be "Potentially Endangered Historic Sites." This relieves the committee/Commission from a certain degree of responsibility or decision about the site at the beginning of the process.

We discussed that the site must be historic in its own right and that cause to be considered a potentially endangered historic site would be any action/condition that would endanger the site.

We would like to develop an "application" form which would include details about the site. We would also like photographs to be taken, and research to be done on each site as

an archive of the property. This is especially important as some endangered historic sites are demolished and the chance to preserve at least the memory of the site is lost.

Our initial checklist for status as an endangered historic site included:

- 1. Criteria to determine historic value we can use the same criteria and point scale that the commission uses to determine is a site has sufficient historic significance. This could require a visit by some sort of survey committee.
- 2. Criteria to determine if the site is potentially endangered
- a. it is in an at risk location (i.e. is a bypass planned through the site)
- b. it is at risk because it is in an area slated for development or prime for development
- c. it is at risk due to demolition by neglect
- d. it is at risk due to abuse or modification
- 3. Document sites determined to be potentially endangered in a binder with photographs and a history of the site
- 4. Update yearly each year check on the status of each site and document findings/contacts made
- 5. Presentation at a pre-determined event, with an award for the Top 10 in improvements or moving toward being removed from the list or a special award if moved off the list (no longer deemed potentially endangered)
- 6. Draft a letter to be sent to those considered for this list. The letter should clearly state that this status is solely for education purposes only, to aid the site owner, and is not being used to force a course of action.



State of Illinois Preservation Conference — Lake Forest — September 16th. Jim Keefe and I attended the state conference on the above date. It was well organized and very informative, I attended the City of Evanston Historic District seminar. It was very interesting. Evanston has two historic districts and when they proposed the third they didn't foresee problem. However, a group organized the vehemently opposed the district. The plan commission chair spoke, the citizens that were proponents of the district spoke and an Alderman from the City of Evanston spoke. The Alderman spoke last and wrapped up by stating that the city redrew the lines of the proposed district, eliminating the area where the opposition resided and passed an amended district. I thought it was an interesting approach to a very difficult problem. It was a great learning tool. Jim attended the Restoration of your Historic Home seminar. We both attended the Jens Jensen seminar (see brochure), one of the original natural landscape designers. We both then took the tour of Lake Forest Great Homes and Gardens. Today I did an inspection of a farmstead that was obtained by the Huntley Park Dist. This was done at the request of Maryanne. Paul Olstrander, park manager had a meeting on Sept 26th and needed some direction from our commission.

The farmstead is the first location on Main St, Huntley on the west .It was owned by the Diecke's. He was a farmer and an insurance co owner. He donated Diecke Park to the city. This land is 42 acres and it adjoins the park and the High School property.

The plans of the district are to make this a historical farm. The McHenry County Historical Barn Preservation Association has already checked it out and they are in approval. I have attached their letter.

There is a historical barn(circa 1890 ish), a smoke house, a corn crib, and a milk house. These are the old buildings. However there is a garage (1960) and the house which has had additions on it over the years. The house itself has handhued and pole rafters in parts. The stone foundation is also from the 1890's but the rafters make the original house much older.

The survey committee can look it over but my feelings are that the whole farmstead can be designated. Pictures are also enclosed.

Maureen Taylor of the Village of Cary and I met to discuss the Scenic Road Program. We met at Panerra Bread and had a great talk (and a delicious pecan roll and coffee). She is an employee of the Village of Cary and his been assigned to this program. She and I will work together to put together criteria and design an application. I talked to Scott Berger; again, Kane County Planner and he will be forwarding their Scenic Road Program information. He did inform me that the application requires owner approval. He said that even though many of the major landowners do not reside in Kane County the County Board would not approve non-owner approval. However, I think we would be better served not to make this program part of our ordinance at this time. I think this is the wrong year, election time makes elected officials nervous.

In my discussions with Scott, he also informed me that Kane County had revised their Preservation Ordinance and cleaned up some of the unclear areas. I asked him to send us a copy of Kane County's revised ordinance and he said he would.

The landmarking at the Carr/Harrison went well. It was a beautiful day and the ceremony was well attended. I estimate approximately 40 people attended from the families. Jim Pearson, Gail, and myself attended from the Commission and the Village of Ringwood President and one Trustee attended.

Carr - Harrison Cemetery

This is a double cemetery that became one over the passing of time. Joseph Carr brought his family here in 1837 and purchased this land including the western half of the cemetery. John Harrison settled in McHenry County in 1839 and in 1842 purchased the land which includes the eastern half of the cemetery. It is somewhat unusual for adjacent neighbors to develop separate adjoining cemeteries. Harrison came from a large family with many of his siblings and their families already living in this area. Carr had a large family of his own with nine children. It was a grim fact of life in those days that a large family could easily fill a small cemetery.

Since both families had an English background and lived so close together, it was inevitable that they would eventually intermarry. In 1860, Richard Carr and Jane Harrison were joined in matrimony. Since that time the cemeteries have been like a married couple - united but still separate entities. The deeds for this cemetery were officially recorded in 1891 for the Harrison portion and in 1899 for the Carr portion.

It is a tribute to the Carr and Harrison families that this unique double cemetery has been in continual burial use by both families through the passing of time and is still in use by both families now 160 years later.
