The following is a report regarding the activities conducted for the grant-funded Rural Structures Survey during fiscal year 2014, which runs through November 30th.

APRIL

- The McHenry County Board approved the grant, matching funds, and the consultant contract on 2014 April 1st. The County Auditor has encumbered the appropriate funds in the County budget.
- A County Board Chair signed copy of the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency's contract with the County was mailed on 2014 April 22nd.
- A tele-conference was held on April 21st between Amy Hathaway (IHPA), and the McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission Chairman, Steve Greeley, and Sean Foley, Staff Liaison, of the on to discuss grant requirements and procedures.
- A copy of the consulting contract between the County and the University of Illinois at Urbana—Champaign for the survey was finalized and received by this department 2014 April 22nd. (Unless otherwise noted, the work completed and noted here is performed by the consultants: the University of Illinois, Public Service Archaeology & Architecture Program. Marcy Prchal is our main point of contact and Kevin McGowan oversees the program.)

MAY

- A field survey form for this project has been created by of the University of Illinois for the purposes of gathering raw data in the field.
- Work began on the resource analysis form for final survey results.
- Work has continued on establishing a projected timeline for this project.

JUNE

- Commissioner Gray attended the Certified Local Government seminar in Springfield on June 3rd.
- Work has continued on establishing a projected timeline for this project.
- Historic background research has begun for the townships addressed by this project.

JULY

- Historic background research has continued for the townships addressed by this project.
- A map book of the survey area has been created.

AUGUST

MCHENRY COUNTY HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

- Survey of Riley Township began.
- Historic background research has been completed for the townships of the survey.
- A map book of the survey area has been reviewed and edited as needed.
- Several reference maps, historical and modern, were sent to the consultant by the McHenry County Staff Liaison.
- Data sheets for approximately 310 properties from the 1986-87 survey were sent to the consultant by the Staff Liaison.
- We received a revised contract from the IHPA, which was forwarded to the McHenry County State's Attorney for review.

SEPTEMBER

- Survey of Riley Township has continued.
- Surveys of Marengo and Dunham Townships began.
- The McHenry County Assistant State's Attorney completed a review of the revised IHPA—McHenry County grant contract.

OCTOBER

- Surveys of Riley and Marengo Townships have been completed.
- Survey of Dunham Township has continued.
- A report for Marengo Township is being prepared as an example for review and comment by the Commission.
- The Staff Liaison sent a response/comment letter regarding the IHPA-MCHPC contract revisions to the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency.

NOVEMBER

- Survey of Dunham Township was completed with the exception of the town of Chemung, which is in progress.
- A presentation session has been scheduled for the regular HPC meeting in January 2015 for review and comment on the preliminary report for Marengo Township prepared by Marcy Prchal.

Annual Report of tasks completed in 2014

2014 was a busy year for the MCHPC. I was able to attend and actively participate in 9 out of 12 MCHPC monthly meetings as well as a few additional events. I visited the site of the candidate landmark Haligus School on May 1, 2014 with Commissioner Gray. At the May MCHPC meeting I presented the initial report, then in June drafted the commission's official resolution to landmark the school. On September 20, I had the honor of emceeing the Landmark Dedication ceremony of the Haligus School, an event attended by commissioners Stelford, Gray and Mack. Also in attendance was County Board member Paula Yensen who spoke at the event.

At the August monthly MCHPC meeting I proposed a resolution to formally recognize the City of Woodstock for their outstanding efforts to maintain the city's historic structures. The resolution was discussed, voted on and passed at that meeting.

On September 10, 2014, commissioners Gray, Selpien and myself met with Gail Brown of the McHenry County Conservation District at the Powers-Walker Farmstead in Glacier Park for a tour of the house and barn. Following the visit I submitted the initial report at the October MCHPC meeting. In November the commission voted to accept the application for landmark status.

Finally in December my wife and I attended the annual MCHPC meeting and dinner, preceded by a tour of the old historic McHenry County Courthouse in downtown Woodstock.

McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission 2014 Municipal Liaison Annual Report Submitted by Gloria Mack

In January of 2014 Curt Bulgaka and I discussed the March Joint Council meeting. I suggested we contact Crystal Lake as they are celebrating their Centennial this year. We decided to contact Crystal Lake and see if they agree.

The Spring 2014 Joint Council Meeting was held at the Crystal Lake Beach House. The speaker was Diana Kenney who presented a program on the upcoming Crystal Lake Centennial celebration. (See attached notice) Approximately 30 members attended.

In April of 2014 I met with McHenry Township Supervisor, Donna Schaefer and asked her to attend our meeting, McHenry Township has assumed responsibility for maintenance for Ostend Cemetery, A McHenry County Landmark. Ms Schaefer, reported that a fence was scheduled to be erected and signage will be recreated to reflect the original signage. The Commission gave her permission to proceed.

Also in April of 2014 I was invited to attend an information meeting at McHenry County Conservation District of get an update on the Legislative changes that MCCD is seeking.

At the conclusion of the meeting I spoke to Executive Director Elizabeth Kessler and scheduled a meeting on April 28th to submit a Landmark Application for the Powers Walker House. After negotiations several changes were agreed upon, The Powers Walker site included the house and barn, and excluded the existing road and parking area.

In May of 2014 I attended the Ridgefield Schools 100th Anniversary. It is currently in use by a Synagogue. The speakers included Nancy Fike, a former teacher and Herb Franks. They had a very nice display of artifacts.

It was decided we would hold our Fall 2014 meeting at the Turner Camp, in Algonquin. The Turner Camp is a private organization that is celebrating their 100th anniversary. The camp was and is a summer camp for people of German descent. Many summer campers date back to the original settlers. Our speaker was the person in charge of maintenance for the camp. Approximately 20 members attended. (See attached notice).

It was called to our attention that the Marengo Historic Commission was disbanding. I contacted Marengo City Manager, Gary Boden, and agreed to send him information on entering into and intergovernmental agreement with McHenry County to handle their preservation. After several conversations he asked that I contact the Mayor. I will contact him in January of 2015.

I addition to my routine responsibilities, this December I contacted, by mail, all our intergovernmental communities. Which includes the Villages of Bull Valley, Ringwood, Trout Valley, Cary, Richmond and Johnsburg? The correspondence reminded them of our agreement and suggested several sites that were suitable for Landmarking.

McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission 2014 Education Annual Report Submitted by Gloria Mack

On April 25th I portrayed Margaret Gannon, in the Gannon Cabin, McHenry County Historical Museum, for 4 classes of 4th Graders from Canterbury School, Crystal Lake. They were a great group of children, inquisitive and interested.

On May 23rd, I presented a program to 40, 5th graders at Montini School, McHenry. The teacher contacted me and asked me to help her wrap up their unit on the Civil War. I presented a program on the home front, McHenry County. I also presented them the history of Decoration Day (Memorial Day). The children were very receptive and had many questions. They wanted me to provide them a name of a Civil War soldier buried in Woodlawn Cemetery, adjacent to Montini School. I provided them the information and the teacher called me said the children placed a flag on the grave of Samantha Button's son.

In June, I served as a docent at the Peterson Farm House. This is annual program put on by the McHenry Landmark Commission.



TOWNSHIP NEWS

OSTEND CEMETERY—PRESERVING A HISTORIC CEMETERY

In June of 2013, at a Special Town Meeting, the electors of McHenry Township voted to take responsibility for the Ostend Cemetery on Route 120, just west of Martin Road. Ostend is a historic cemetery that was started in the 1840s and has 128 graves. The last burial was in the 1960s. Most of the graves date from the 1840s to the early 1900s. An endowment from the association of descendants of early settlers interred in the cemetery has helped with damaged tree removal and fencing.

The acre plot would later be consecrated and made into a community cemetery. The community burying ground would come to be called Ostend Cemetery, named after the small Dutch town that grew around it. The name was changed in 1879 to reflect community ties with the school, post office and stagecoach stop. Grave markers indicate interments representing nearly every family in the early neighborhood.



All that is left of the Ostend community are the old grave monuments which serve as a directory of early residents and reflect the ethnic diversity and unique population of this area. This hallowed one-acre plot is off Route 120 west of

the City of McHenry. The cemetery was designated and plaqued a historical landmark in September, 1997. Township Supervisor Donna Schaefer, then a County Board member, gave the dedication presentation address at its dedication.

Mowing and maintenance of the grounds has been easily incorporated into the schedules of our parks and facilities staff. Maintaining historic cemeteries required some additional training since old headstones require new skills to our staff.





In July 2014, The Illinois Historic Preservation Commission staff anthropologist Dawn Cobb and Illinois Department of Natural Resources archeologist Hal Hassen conducted a hands-on workshop in Princeton, Illinois. In attendance, Supervisor Donna Schaefer, Clerk Marsha Nelson and Operations Manager Terry Wagner with his staff Bob Pepping and Jack Warnecke were educated in the proper archeological maintenance of historical headstones. The class involved learning proper techniques for cleaning old marble headstones and repositioning fallen headstones.

The photos below were taken at Ostend Cemetery and show the result of the hands-on experience gained through the July workshop which gave our maintenance staff the

knowledge to reposition a fallen headstone from 1815 at Ostend Cemetery during the first week of September.

Detailed records on the maintenance of all the grave stones will be recorded for future reference.

McHenry Township takes its responsibility as caregivers for this piece of our community's heritage and history seriously and will continue to be good stewards of Ostend Cemetery.

In January of 2014 a Scenic Road application was submitted for Tryon Grove Road. It was rated Outstanding with a point value of 77% by the Commission.

In March of 2014 I attended the McHenry County Transportation Committee Meeting and presented the Tryon Grove application. They were impressed with the application. Also, they will purchase the signs as Tryon Grove is a County Road. I informed the Committee that the dedication would be on May 4th, 12:30 PM at the intersection of Greenwood and Tryon Grove Roads. I requested the signs be installed by Friday, May 3rd.

I requested the Transportation Committee include the Scenic Roads in a sidebar on the next County Road Map. They agreed by consensus.

In 2014 I surveyed all the Scenic Roads to see if the signage is place. Please review the following:

Pioneer Road:

The sign at the intersection of Pioneer and Route 31 is atop

Education – On November 7. 2013 I acted as a Docent for the McHenry County Historical Society's School Tours. I escorted 108 children, from Husmann School, Crystal Lake, to the 5 stations. This was an education for me. I am usually in the cabin; however I was able to observe how all the other stations educate the children.

Municipal Liaison – On December 6, 2013 I was invited to attend an Open House highlighting the newly acquired William Dennison Cary, Founder of Cary, Collection. The Collection was open to the public on December 7th from 12 to 4.

McHenry County Conservation District Historic Resources

HISTORIC RESOURCES / STRUCTURES --- Status Update 12/10/2013


McHenry County Conservation District owns several historic resources/structures. If a structure is pre-civil war (more than 150 years old) and constructed of hand-hewn beams (where the ax marks still show rather than using sawn lumber), then the structure is automatically considered historic.

However, not all historic structures are suitable for restoration due to not having a high enough percentage of original remaining historic integrity. The residence house at Coral Woods, the Klimas house at Glacial park on Route 31, the main office at Brookdale, and the Konopasek house and barn at Brookdale North are examples of this type of historic structure lacking sufficient historic integrity for restoration.

The conditions of the Camp Algonquin buildings are questionable. While only a few of the Camp Algonquin buildings are older and still have their historic integrity (specifically the 1920's dairy barn), most of the buildings are either in a state of "demolition by neglect", are newer, or have been substantially modified.

Although there are other District structures that are over 100 years old or even over 50 years old and could be considered historic depending on the historic context and circumstances, the District does own 4 historic resource sites that have retained their historic integrity. They are Wiedrich barn in Glacial Park, the Power-Walker house and barn in Glacial Park, the McConnell Farmstead which is part of North Branch site in Richmond, and the Kennedy Way Station which is a part of Brookdale. The following details the current status of each of these structures/sites.

Wiedrich Barn:




Wiedrich Barn is located in Glacial Park and is currently not is use.


Formerly it was an education and rental facility. It has been restored and set-up for adaptive reuse with offices, meeting space and restrooms. It has also in the past been used as a warming station for cross-country skiers and sledding.

Wiedrich Barn was part of the original Glacial park purchase in 1975.

Powers Walker Historic Site:

Pre-Civil War Powers-Walker Barn

The Powers-Walker Historic Site is located in Glacial Park and consists of 2 structures, the original house and barn from the 1850's. The house is 85% restored with most of the work being on-going maintenance. The barn is stabilized, but not restored. It is currently covered with tin/steel panels, but all of the original wood is underneath the metal. The first step of restoration is to re-roof the barn in the appropriate wood shake shingles.

The Powers-Walker site is actively used for educational programs representing early settler life and their connection with the land. The programs and restoration of this site is done primarily by volunteers. In the past 18 years, over 19,000 volunteers hours have been put into this project with over 5,000 people in attendance in the last 7 years of public programs.

The Kennedy Way Station:




This house is part of the Brookdale site located on the south side of Route 14 just east of Deep Cut Road. It is an 1850's red brick Greek Revival house that was used as a women's boarding house during early settlement times.

The Kennedy Way Station is landmarked/ plaqued by the McHenry County Historical Society. It was part of the 400+ acre Paulsen purchase in 2001. It has been most recently used as staff housing, but is currently vacant.

1872 McConnell House


McConnell Farmstead:

In 1999 the McHenry Conservation District purchased the McConnell Farmstead as part of a larger parcel to preserve and protect the high quality North Branch of the Nippersink Creek. The North Branch Conservation Area, which has grown to just over 520 acres, is open to the public via the Keystone Road parking lot and provides a link from the Prairie Path to the multiuse Hebron Trail.



McConnell Big Barn

In 2006 the District Board of Trustees approved the Nippersink North Branch Conservation Area Master Plan and with it the concept to restore and develop the McConnell Farmstead for educational programming of late 1800's farm life and technologies. The McConnell Friends Foundation, a not-for-profit organization is assisting site restoration with regularly monthly volunteer work days.



McConnell Hand-Hewn Barn

Site debris clean-up began in 2001 as a combination of volunteer time augmented by district resources when available with the primary focus being placed on the house while trying to stabilize and retain other historic buildings from the original farmstead.

In the past 12 years, over 5,000 volunteer hours have been put into this project.



About the Cemetery

The Lake Avenue Cemetery (originally known simply as the "Crystal Lake Cemetery") is the oldest public burying ground in Crystal Lake and Algonquin Township. The cemetery was laid out in 1840. According to the book, "The History of McHonry County, Illinois," which was first published in 1885, the first person buried here was Ella King, daughter of Isaac and Almina King.

The cemetery eventually became part of the large estate of Charles S. Dole. Mr. Dole traded the cemetery land to the village of Crystal Lake in exchange for allowing a road to be run down to the lake and his home. The new road changed the orientation of the cemetery. Today's front of the cemetery actually used to be the back!

Since 1840, nearly 1,200 people have been buried in this two acre cometery. Many of the early settlers of Crystal Lake are buried here.

The Lake Avenue Cemetery Is owned and maintained by Algonquin Township. On August 15, 2000, the Crystal Lake City Council voted unanimously to approve the application for Landmark Designation of the Lake Avenue Cemetery.

The Docket: Can Restrictive Covenants for Cemetery Be Buried?

The Docket is a monthly TitleNews Online feature provided by ALTA's Title Counsel Committee, which reviews significant court rulings and other legal developments, and explains the relevance to the title insurance industry.

Today's review of a decision by the Maryland Court of Appeals ruling that restrictive covenants remain in effect despite radically changed demographic and economic circumstances was provided by Sally Prester McCash, an attorney at the law firm Joseph Greenwald & Laake. Citation: Dumbarton Improvement Association, Inc. v. Druid Ridge Cemetery Company, 434 Md. 37, 73 A3d 224 (Aug 22, 2013).

Facts: This case involves a 1913 property covenant imposed on 200-acre tract of land requiring that it be "maintained and operated as a cemetery." Located in an area once outside the Baltimore city limits, but now a close-in location to the urban footprint, subject to possible wetland regulations that threatened its economic viability, the cemetery wished to sell off a portion of the original tract never used for gravesites to help fund the maintenance of the rest of the cemetery. Facing objections from the adjoining homeowner's association, the contract purchaser of the property (seeking to develop a portion of the property for semi-detached residences) sought a ruling that the covenant was unenforceable because it was ambiguous, or alternatively, that the radically changed circumstances in the neighborhood and the cemetery industry rendered the covenant ineffective and unenforceable.

Holding: Reversing the Baltimore County Maryland Circuit Court and the Court of Special Appeals, Chief Judge Robert Bell upheld the restrictive covenant as clear and unambiguous. Finding no basis for different interpretations of "the said property" or "maintained and operated as a cemetery," the court disallowed the use of extrinsic evidence to interpret the restrictive covenant as only intending to be applicable to already developed portions of the cemetery. Further, he ruled that even dramatic changes in demographic and economic circumstances surrounding the property did not render the restrictive covenant unenforceable since there was no strong connection between the changed circumstances and the unambiguous purpose of the restrictive covenant.

Relevance to the Title Industry: Maryland has increased the burden to be met to avoid enforcement of even burdensome and no longer appropriate restrictive covenants. Changes in the surrounding area from largely agricultural to a busy commercial urban hub, and even occasional violations of the covenants on the affected property are not sufficient to permit wholesale removal of a restrictive covenant. The cemetery in the middle of your subdivision may have to remain.

Illinois Rehabilitation and Revitalization Tax Credit Act

Strengthening Illinois' Economy by Reinvesting in Historic Places
HB4533 - Rep. Frank Mautino

A coalition of developers, investors, building industry representatives, and nonprofit organizations is actively promoting the Illinois Rehabilitation and Revitalization Tax Credit to encourage private investment in historic properties. Urban, suburban, and rural communities across Illinois will benefit from the jobs and economic development generated through the Tax Credit, which is similar to provisions in 32 other states.

How Does It Work?

- Allows credit up to \$3 million per project on state income taxes equal to 20% of the qualified cost of a historic rehabilitation.
- Useful for income-producing properties including commercial, residential, and industrial developments. It does not apply to owner-occupied residential and properties must be designated as historic.
- Parallels 20% federal historic preservation tax credit, creating more development opportunities in Illinois and leveraging millions of dollars in federal monies not currently flowing into our state.

Economic, Environmental, and Community Benefits

Impressive Return on Investment (ROI)

⇒ A study by the University of Illinois-Springfield found that the state tax credit is expected to return up to \$10 for every \$1 invested.

Targeted Program

⇒ Only National Register listed or certified properties are eligible and must meet functional obsolescence and financial needs tests.

Measurable Impact

⇒ The legislation provides for an annual program report to the Assembly documenting job creation, private investment, and ROI to the State.

Creates jobs and economic activity far beyond level of tax credit.

- ⇒ Historic rehab is more labor intensive than new construction with 60-70% of the investment in labor rather than materials.
- ⇒ Increased labor costs <u>creates more jobs</u> than new construction resulting in greater income and sales tax revenue.
- ⇒ State tax credits have spurred more than \$1 billion in economic activity in states like Maryland, Missouri, and Virginia.

Replenishes tax base by increasing payroll, sales, and property taxes.

- ⇒ The program begins to return income and sales tax dollars to the State several years before the credit is redeemed. In Maryland, the state captured \$.34 for each \$1 before the credit was awarded, and \$1.02 within the first year.
- ⇒ Encourages private investment in vacant or underutilized buildings putting neglected properties back on the tax rolls at a higher value and catalyzing investment in surrounding areas.

Government efficiency

⇒ By pairing with the Federal Historic Tax Credit process already administered by IHPA, the state program will run efficiently.

STATE REHAB TAX CREDITS AND JOB CREATION

- ⇒ A total of 6,871 jobs and \$60 million in tax revenue was created in the first four years of Missouri's tax credit.
- ⇒ In Rhode Island, direct construction employment generated by rehab credit projects was 5,334 over two years.
- ⇒ In Minnesota, historic rehab projects create 5.7 more jobs per \$1 million in output than manufacturing and 2 more jobs per \$1 million than new construction.

Illinois Rehabilitation and Revitalization Tax Credit (IRRTC)

HB4533 - Rep. Frank Mautino

Specific Bill Provisions

• Section 5. Definitions

- ⇒ Program administered by IHPA and DCEO;
- ⇒ "Qualified expenditures" follows definition used for Federal Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit; "Qualified structures" include a building listed in the National Register of Historic Places or located in certified historic district.
- ⇒ Applicants incur qualified expenditures "at their own risk;"

Section 10. Functional obsolescence test

- ⇒ Uses language that exists in several Illinois statutes dating back to 1947;
- ⇒ Projects with expenditures over \$1,000,000 must prove that they are legitimately in need of the incentive;
- ⇒ These tests are designed to attract private investment to projects that would have significant community impact, but that will not attract or qualify for typical private investment.

• Section 15. Program Time Limitation

⇒ Enacts the IRRTC program for five years with an end date of December 31, 2019;

• Section 20. Economic needs test (i.e. "but, for" test)

⇒ DCEO will determine, for projects with expenditures over \$1,000,000, if the development will not otherwise benefit from private investment without public intervention.

Section 25. Transfer of credits

⇒ The credit may be transferred allowing for maximum private investment into the project.

Section 30. Maximum limits

⇒ Each applicant is limited to a maximum of a \$3,000,000 state income tax credit per project.

• Section 35. Annual Program Cap

⇒ Provides for annual aggregate program cap beginning at \$10 million with yearly stepped increases reflecting the growing number of shovel-ready projects and capture of continued tax revenue from past recipients;

• Section 40. Application process

- ⇒ The application process is first-come, first-served and applicants must prove eligibility and ownership and estimate qualified expenses, project start and completion date to enable program meets set legislative goals;
- ⇒ Allows for rescission of preliminary IRRTC, and reallocation to other projects, if applicant fails to comply with guidelines;
- ⇒ If qualified expenses incurred are more than estimated, applicant must submit a new application for the excess amount;
- ⇒ Applicant pays \$1,000 upfront application fee divided between IHPA and DCEO to administer the program and pays up to 2% of the amount of credits issued after final approval;
- ⇒ In order in qualify for the IRRTC, the applicant's rehabilitation plan must also be certified by the National Park Service as meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation;
- ⇒ Rehabilitation must commence within two years of preliminary approval for an IRRTC allocation, which is awarded to qualified and completed projects only;
- ⇒ DCEO will require an outside audit of the applicant's cost certification if the rehabilitation plan is over \$250,000;
- ⇒ DCEO shall work with Revenue to capture outstanding state tax liability by applicant that can be satisfied by the IRRTC.

Section 45. Biennial report

 \Rightarrow The bill has added a biennial reporting mechanism that will calculate the overall economic impact to the State through the IRRTC program. The Biennial Report shall include the jobs created by the program.





On March 6, 2014 I attended the Planning and Development Committee Meeting which preliminarily approved our request to have the County Board provide us with the funds to cover our portion of the grant. It then had to be officially approved at their Meeting of March 20, 2014 which was attended by Lynn Gray. I also informed Kevin McGowan at U of I that we received the award and that they would get started right away upon County Board approval.

On March 12, 2014 I went to the Richmond Township and Hebron Township Meetings to advise them of our Tryon Grove Road dedication ceremony and they were both in full support and wanted to attend. I also attended the Joint Council Meeting on March 26, 2014 along with Dave, Sue and Gail and a great presentation with photographs was presented on the history of Crystal Lake. In addition, I spoke with Mr. Wirtz who wanted our advice on raising funds for the Peterson Farm Foundation. I also spoke with Donna Britton with the Huntley Historic Commission who is trying to get an interior designer or architect to volunteer time to get the dimensions of the Sawyer Mill so that a replica can be made. She also mentioned that there would be a gathering at some point to recognize the history of the mill to hopefully convince the City to change their mind on the demolition. On March 28, 2014 I spoke with Dawn Peterson who owns Oney's Tree Farm in Woodstock who expressed concern with the new UDO Zoning Ordinance that she said would impact her ability to have her Christmas Tree Festival in the one hundred and ten year old barn on the property as the new Ordinance requires full compliance with code on structures used for such a temporary event. I advised her that I believed that while our ordinance requires us to promote and support the history of our County, it is limited as far as structures go to the exterior portions of the historic structures and the uses are not dealt with by us but by the County Planning and Zoning Department.

Rural Survey Report for April 2, 2014 McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission regular monthly meeting made by Lynn M. Gray, Rural Survey Chair

I attended the March 20th P&D meeting at 8Am Administration Building on Ware Road where the item came up on the agenda of approving the expenditure for matching funds for the Grant for the Rural Survey. I am happy to report that it was a unanimous vote "YES" to approve the expenditure, with no discussion as Steve Greely spelled out the need in the previous meeting.

I filled out a FOIA request to get a copy of the wrecking application – and did receive it. It gives the phone number for the owner and the wrecking company.

Further research of the 417 Busse Road house has resulted in contact with the owner Don Pelfresne via phone call. He stated that he is not demolishing the house of his own free will – Planning & Development has sued him to do so McHenry County Case # 130V000430. I wonder why this info is not disclosed on the Wrecking Permit.??

I also called the Demo Company listed on the Wrecking Permit Application "King Cut" and they said they had nothing to do with this project and were contacting the P&D department to have themselves REMOVED from the Application.

I went to the house and got photos from outside at every angle I could think of as well as a few photos through a broken window showing the original crown molding, trim, and not one, not two, but THREE sets of solid wood double doors on original hardware are still intact. I believe this house to be in ORIGINAL size, shape and footprint – no evidence of any additions are present. Look closely at the photos of the front of the house facing Busse Road – in the dormers there is some sort of decorative woodwork, it is hard to see because all of the aluminum siding is not removed from the peeks.

I checked the 1862 County Plat map and YES this house is shown on it with a black square denoting a residence was there at the time and shows E.A. Pease as the owner.

I did find the death notice for E.A. Pease in the Woodstock Sentinel April 13, 1864 issue, sad it says death was by suicide. His wife and surviving children stayed in the area – Lucy Finley Pease is listed in the McHenry County Genealogical Society's web site as being one of the earliest settlers in Marengo, stating she & Enos A. Pease came in 1836. They had 7 children 3 boys and 4 girls, one of their sons died in the Civil War.

I will continue to work on preserving this house, Mr. Pelfresne has scheduled a call with me for Thursday April 3rd at 10Am, we will be discussing options to prevent demolition, including selling the house to preserve it. Further details next month.






commons Rd. TROUT VALLEY, IL 60013. He says "It was built 1890 and was one of the original homes built in the area.

Riding my pony and horses with neighbor kids took up most of my "spare time". I could ride through many neighboring farms as well as beautiful Northern Pump Hereford Farm—now Glacial Park. We all knew to stay out of cropland and to close any gates we opened. Neighbors all knew each other and we kids knew to behave or someone's Mom would be on the phone to our Moms.

My Mother was always quick to bake or cook for a family having a hard time and ready with advice or a helping hand for a new Mother. Although I spent many hours on horseback, there were always chores needing to be done at home. Hauling in corncobs and coal for the heating stove in the kitchen, doing dishes, mowing lawn, weeding garden, driving the Ford Jubilee tractor on the hay fork, and throwing down silage and feeding heifers were just a few. As you can see, I much preferred the outside chores to inside. And of course the care of the pony and horses was always my responsibility.

I am so lucky to still have some of those original neighbors. Our road is beautiful with houses and farms well cared for---many of us from those "good old days" or descendants of those neighbors."

It is with great honor that we stand today on this site and designate Tryon Grove Road as a McHenry County Scenic Road.

Below and on the back cover are statements from some of the residents of Tryon Grove Road:

"Tryon Grove Road, anchored at its western terminus by historic Tryon Grove Farm, established circa 1836, provides a rolling pathway through one of the most aesthetically pleasing vistas in northeastern McHenry County. Rolling hillsides, meadows and remnant oak savannahs provide a reminder of what the area presented to early 1830's settlers—the Tryons, Stewarts, and Vanderkarrs, families who sent their sons as soldiers to defend our Union in the Civil War. Notice the witness tree at the corner of Greenwood, Vanderkarr, and Tryon Grove Roads referenced and recorded by a midnineteenth century survey team.

Tryon Grove Road, once a frequented animal path, was traveled by our Native Americans in their annual pilgrimage to sacred burial grounds. This trail was also one of the first planked roads carrying settlers west.

As you proceed east, enjoy the southern view of mixed grasslands, kames, and wetlands preserved as Glacial Park, the jewel of the McHenry County Conservation District, now encompassed by the newly create national wildlife refuge, The Hackmatack Preserve. Relatively unspoiled, Tryon Grove Road and the lands it touches are assets which make McHenry County such an attractive place to live, work, and play. Designation of Tryon Grove Road as a McHenry County Scenic Road will provide deserved recognition and a reminder to appreciate not only one's destination but also the process of getting there."


CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I also attended the final walk through of the Sawyer Mill in Huntley on April 24th and there are quite a few artifacts that are going to be preserved, including the gear and other Mill pieces, doors, tables and the original tin siding. We also found some of the documentation from when the Mill was in operation.

Finally, on April 27th I attended the one hundred year anniversary celebration of the Ridgefield School that was hosted by the McHenry County Jewish Congregation and in part put on by our very own Audrey Martin. Speakers included Nancy Fike, Velma Duysart who was a former teacher and principal of the School as well as one of the founding members of the Congregation, Herb Franks, who discussed the circumstances surrounding the acquisition of the School. Many artifacts were also found in the attic and crawlspaces of the School which were on display.



History of the building we now call MCJC-

McHenry County Jewish Congregation (MCJC) was founded in 1979, when the "Lox and Bagel Club" and the women's welcome wagon realized there were quite a few Jews out in McHenry County after all. At first they didn't have a permanent home. But when Crystal Lake District 47 closed the old Ridgefield School in 1980 and put the building up for auction, a group of founding MCJC members put together a bid. They were successful at the May 1981 auction, and on August 30, 1981, MCJC dedicated its new building.

Today, MCJC is the center of Jewish life in McHenry County. But when this building was built, it was the center of community life in the Ridgefield area.

The building was built as a two-room school house in 1914 (notice the cornerstone next to the front door), after the previous school house burned the year before. At the time, there were 140 one- and two-room school houses across McHenry County. These schools served the children of farm families, but also served as community centers, polling places and meeting houses.

The original building, designated District 48, had two rooms (the front ones you see today), with lower grades in one room and upper grades in the other. Enrollment was about 50-60 students. Indoor plumbing and electric lights were installed in 1949. In 1958, faced with overcrowded facilities, the school expanded, adding the back part of the building with two large classrooms upstairs (now our sanctuary) and a large multi-purpose room downstairs. The school also added two acres of land in the back.

However, enrollment fell in the 1960s. In July 1973, District 48 was merged into District 47. Enrollment continued to fall in the 1970s, and the district finally closed the school in 1980.

For 35 years, this "little shul on the prairie" has been home to MCJC. But it has always been a house of learning. Mazel tov on this centennial celebration!

The sign was unveiled by John Hammerand. After the ceremony we walked to the Tryon Grove Farmstead for refreshments.

County officials in attendance: Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Sandquist, who traveled over 2 other Scenic Roads to attend. County Board members, John Hammerand and Nick Chirikos. Also Elizabeth Kessler director of MCCD was in attendance. Commissioners in attendance: Lynn Grey, Gloria Mack, and MCCD Liaison Gail Brown.

To prepare for the program the following was accomplished:

- Gail Brown and I worked on the Fliers for the County Officials and the Program for the ceremony. I gave Gail the information and she designed the aforementioned.
- Contacted P&D to confirm the letters to the all the residents of Tryon Grove Rd., were sent.
- I ordered the cake with the Road Sign as decoration. (We had to be sure the sign was not protected by copyright laws.)
- On 5/1 I contacted the Northwest Herald. Information was sent on the Scenic Road program, they intended to send a photographer. That did not happen.
- Also on 5/1 I checked to see if the signs were up, not. I called the Highway Department to make sure they would be installed by 5/2.
- On 5/3 I helped Don and Felicia set up before and clean up after the refreshments.
- I sent Thank you notes to Don and Felicia Englert for opening the Tryon Grove Farmstead for the Scenic Road refreshments and John Hammerand for speaking.
- I stopped on Monday to personally thank Jeff Young for getting the signs up.

Municipal Liaison:

Conservation District Seeks Legislative Changes

April 2, 2014, McHenry County, IL - Since its creation in 1971, the District has successfully balanced the high demand for public access and site amenities while preserving the natural and cultural heritage that defines the region. Today, the District is responsible for the guardianship of more than 25,000 acres of open space and 32 conservation areas, 30 miles of regional trails that provide access to over 100 miles of an integrated trail network, and is nationally recognized as a leader in conservation and environmental stewardship.

The proposed legislation (SB 3341 & SB 3342) introduced by Illinois State Senator Pamela J. Althoff supports the District's commitment to transparency and fiscal accountability by ensuring public investments and access to improvements are preserved and maintained for current and future generations. Let us briefly explain what the legislation does:

Senate Bill 3341

Recently, the District received a legal opinion from bond counsel that the statutory language does not sufficiently distinguish voter-approved referendum bonds from non-referendum bonds for the purposes of determining debt capacity. Other units of local government, such as Illinois park districts, encountered a similar interpretation in the 1990's and were granted legislative clarification from the Illinois General Assembly to correct the issue. The District is asking for the same clarification.

Senate Bill 3342

Over the years the District has acquired key properties that preserve the rich history of the county. These historic sites provide connections to where the first settlers laid down their roots, where the stagecoach rumbled through and to where a century of family farming occurred. Opportunities exist to protect our county's cultural heritage, safeguard deteriorating structures, and provide public access to new sites if an additional funding source becomes available.

- More-

The District is committed to the future vision of McHenry County and is steadfast in providing residents with the amenities that will add value and significance to the area they call home. It is this vision that drives our mission to secure operating funds to make that possible. Key properties of historic significance include Camp Algonquin of which was recently named to the Landmarks Illinois' annual *Ten Most Endangered Historic Places* (Fox Bluff Conservation Area), McConnel Farmstead, Kennedy Way Station and Inn - Stage Coach Stop (Brookdale Conservation Area), Wiedrich Barn (Glacial Park), and Powers Walker House (Glacial Park).

SB 3342 allows the McHenry County Conservation District to ask voters through referendum if it should increase its general corporate rate up to .15%. This rate increase is necessary if the District is to broaden its mission to preserve, restore, maintain and provide public access to historic structures of cultural significance on properties owned by the District.

McHenry County Historic Preservation Commission June 4, 2014 Report – Gloria Mack

On May 23rd I presented a program to 40, 5th grade students from Montini School. The teacher contacted me and asked me to help wrap up their unit on the Civil War. I presented program on the home front, specifically McHenry County. I also presented them the history of Decoration Day (Memorial Day).

The children were very receptive and loaded with questions. They asked if I could provide them the name of a Civil War soldier buried in Woodlawn Cemetery, adjacent to Montini School. I provided the information and the teacher told me the class placed a flag and flowers on the grave of Samantha Button's son.

2014 Goals (Scenic Roads):

I surveyed the following Scenic Roads to evaluate the signage.

Pioneer Road:

The sign at the intersection of Route 31 and Pioneer is affixed atop The Township Road sign. I contacted McHenry Township Road Commissioner, Leon VanEvery, and asked him why the sign did not stand alone. He informed me that there is a group of signs at that location and that the Scenic Road sign was obliterated by the other signs. He decided that sign was more visible atop the Township Road sign. Also FYI, Pioneer is within 3 jurisdictions, the signage at the aforementioned intersection is in McHenry Township.

Greenwood Road: All signs are visible and upright

Fleming Road: All signs are visible and upright

Tryon Grove Road: All signs are visible and upright

Hillside Road: All signs (7) are visible and upright (The best marked road to date)

Mason Hill: The signage at the entry to Mason Hill (Crystal Lake & Mason Hill)

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








FIGURE 5 - AERIAL PHOTOGRAPH (2013)
